




Fest Décor Concept

This India Fest, our Creative Décor team has chosen to let you encounter the Majestic Elephants from India.

The elephants hold a special significance in India of having transported royalty over the centuries. There are festivals where elephants are the center of attraction. In the northern part of India, there is an Elephant festival held every year. This opulent festival begins with an enthralling parade of magnificent elephants adorned with colorful patterns, embroidered garments and gold and silver ornaments. Elephants were the mode of transport for the kings and are still considered to be a symbol of Rajput royalty today. While in the southern part of India, the mega-festival of Thrissur Pooram, famous in Kerala for its parade of elephants and drummers is a visual feast for the eyes. A collection of over 50 elephants are decorated with nettipattams (decorative golden headdress) and painted in strikingly crafted colors.

We will be making an effort to showcase ornately dressed royal elephants. Be ready to be mesmerized!



Making of India Fest 2017

INTENTION: Create a family friendly event by joining our broader community and celebrating all the ways we can when we come together as one. The fest is a good get-together for the community who needs this sort of thing to come together, to process, to touch base and showcase our culture, and seeing the familiar faces of people we see once or twice a year.



CHALLENGE: Shoestring Budget and Declining Resources. There were times we honestly didn't think we could all pull it off. But here we are today in the nuts and bolts planning stage of India Fest gearing up to the final push.

CREW: We are a good mix of engineers, architects, doctors, artists, scientists, chartered accountants, lawyers and parents who keep trying their hands at yet to be discovered skills. We come together from many different states, countries, cultures, and backgrounds to serve those who attend. We are a group that's obsessed with details. Our team is left and right brained with a bit of insanity and craziness that doesn't hurt either. If we may say so ourselves, we are a nice bunch and do good work! The theme of 'Unity in Diversity' very much stands true here.

WHAT WE DO?

Our duties are simple and enjoyable: It's mostly holding things vertical, carrying crates and cables, maybe building a prop like Taj Mahal or Golden Chariot for decor or using forklift if you're comfortable using that. Creating colorful ambience is a challenge where we get to test our skills in carpentry, carving, painting, interior design and of course the hot gluing skills!

We work to finalize sponsors and partnerships and build up our financial resource for the fest, negotiate contracts, work with our community partners, make posters, sell tickets, promote the event, schedule performances, work with performers, set up the stalls, coordinate with parking and patrolling, track the arrival of guests to the festival, organize lines, scan guests tickets, manage logistical details; coordinate equipment, technology, stage changes, lighting, patrol and perform "rounds" as required and report any security concerns. We are also challenged to think creatively when it comes to promoting the fest. Apart from the 'word of mouth' tweeting and buzzing, we have also been reaching out through the traditional media like TV, magazines, and radio. It might not be listed on every festival guide but everyone knows about it and everyone wants to come.

On the fest day, there is a lot of last minute scrambling to get things in place, sometimes things may not go as planned and may be inevitable and completely outside of your control. At times like these we have to think on our feet and react quickly. It takes nerves not to crumble and quickly come up with a new plan of action. On the plus side, there is no time to worry about it and the adrenalin often kicks in. We really must "Keep Calm and Carry On."

After the event, we also become the 'Leave No Trace' crew where destruction is the fun part! This is where we showing off our awesome cleaning skills; making sure this event doesn't dirtify the place. Yes, we grab a pair of gloves and a garbage bag and leave it better than we found. Then brag about how many pieces we picked to find the coolest score!





Out of the 29 states in India, Tamil Nadu is a state in South India, which inherits an extraordinary cultural legacy expressed in language, literature, music, dance, theatre, cuisine, costumes, celebrations, philosophy, traditions, rituals, etc.

Tamil is the official language of Tamil Nadu and is considered one of the classical languages of the There are a number of world. classical literatures written in Tamil language. Tolkappiyam, Silappathikaram, Manimegalai and Thirukkural are to name a few. The classical dance form of Tamil Nadu is Bharathanatyam, formal attire for Tamil Nadu is silk saree and dothi.

We would like to showcase unity in diversity in the form of bommai kolu, which is a doll and figurine display, a customary ritual in Tamil Nadu. Bommai kolu is an exhibition of various dolls which will be arranged in odd numbered rows and columns (padis). Dolls are disdepictions plaved with the puranas, court life, royal procession. weddings. evervday scenes, etc.

Punjab (Northwest Region of India) is known as the land of five rivers, composed of two Persian words, 'Panj' means five and 'Aab' Means water. Punjabi culture and traditions are one of the oldest. distinguished and the most ancient ones in the world. It demonstrates a rich history of well-developed ancient civilizations. The culture of Punjabi's shows its diversity and rich cultural heritage including different fields like philosophy, spirituality, education, poetry, artistry, music, cuisine, science, technology, architecture, traditions, values and its history.

The unique dances of Punjab like Bhangra and Giddha, their colorful festivals such as Lohri, Baisakhi, Teej, and harvest festivals represent the vibrant and diverse culture of Punjab known for its grandeur and glory. Grand Punjabi weddings displays the uniqueness and richness of its culture. Punjab booth will showcase different aspects of Punjab through several artifacts in a very simple manner.

Kerala, land of coconuts in Malayalam, is a southern state of India. Today it is the home of a diverse population of Keralites also known as Malayalees. Diversity in religion, tradition and culture are very much a part of the everyday life in Kerala. Majority of Malayalees are Hindu with many of other faiths such as Muslims and Christians thriving peacefully together.

This year to commemorate the India Fest theme of Unity in Diversity, we showcase one of the unifying features in Kerala: Kerala backwaters and its natural beauty. Kerala backwaters is a network of five large lakes linked by canals, both manmade and naturally fed by 38 rivers spanning 900km. The backwaters were formed by the action of waves and shore currents creating low barrier islands across the mouths of many rivers flowing down from the Western Ghats range.

They include holy bathing, fasting & abstaining from drinking water, standing in water for long periods of time, and offering prayers (arghya) and oblation to the setting and rising sun."

Located in the West region, Maharashtra is the third largest state of India by size and the second largest by population. Maharashtra is diverse in its riches. It has been reflected through its, forts, caves, palaces known for its rich history, its Saints. philosophers, music, handicrafts and its festivals with all their colorful rituals and which traditions. all οf amalgamate together to give a true reflection of Maharashtrian culture.

Maharashtra is famous for its caves, and rock-cut architecture as in Ajanta Ellora Caves that is also one of the UNESCO as World Heritage Site.

India is one of the much loved countries by gourmet foodies world over. Whether you are vacationing up North of India or enjoying backwaters of the South, you will witness strikingly diverse flavors. Food from one state can be totally foreign to a person from another state. However, the use of a number of different spices to create the unique flavor and aroma is a similarity in Indian cuisine.

Let's take a cuisine-focused look at some of the recipes from different regions of India. We thank our regional communities who contributed their traditional recipes and helped us bring this recipes to you. Try your hand at these Indian recipes and enjoy!

Ras Pua

Recipe contributed by Smt. Poonam Kumar (For Bihar Association)



This Bihari recipe is traditionally served on Holi but can be enjoyed during other special occasions including Diwali! I hope your family enjoys it as much as ours!

Ingredients:

1 cup all-purpose flour (maida)
1/2 cup shredded coconut
1 cup milk
1 tablespoon sugar
1 teaspoon fennel seed (saunf)
1/2 teaspoon cardamom (elaichi) powder
1/4 cup raisins
pinch of baking soda
oil for frying

For syrup:

1 cup sugar 1 cup water 1 teaspoon Rosewater

Instructions:

Mix all eight ingredients and set aside for 2 to 4 hours. Fry 2 to 3 inch diameter Pua in a shallow pan. Set Pua aside on large tray lined with paper towel.

Mix syrup by boiling sugar and water. Leave on low heat for 2 to 3 minutes after sugar has dissolved. Then add rosewater. Pour the syrup on top of the Pua. Let them sit for 2 to 3 hours. Serve at room temperature and enjoy!

Bisi Bele Bath

Recipe contributed by Pushpa Sanjay (For Kannada Sangha)



A delicious complete meal of rice, lentils and vegetables popular from the Karnataka cuisine.

INGREDIENTS (1 cup = 250 ml) For the rice:

1 cup regular rice (I used sona masuri rice)

1/4 cup raw peanuts (moongphali)

¼ teaspoon rock salt (sendha namak)

2.5 cups water for cooking the rice.

For the dal:

34 cup arhar dal (tuvar dal or pigeon pea lentils)

½ teaspoon turmeric powder (haldi)

2 cups water

For the vegetables:

1 medium carrot

18 to 20 french beans

½ cup peas (matar)

3 to 4 small brinjals (baingan or aubergine)

1 medium onion OR 3 to 4 shallots

1 medium tomato OR 80 to 100 grams tomatoes

or 3/3 cup water

2 to 2.5 cups water for cooking the vegetables

1 cup water added later

1/4 teaspoon rock salt for cooking the vegetables

1 teaspoon rock salt added later or add as required

2 tablespoon unsweetened desiccated coconut

For tempering:

3 to 4 tablespoon ghee or oil

1 or 2 marathi moggu (optional)

1 teaspoon mustard (rai or sarson)

2 to 3 dry byadagi/bedgi chilies OR dry red chilies (sookhi lal mirch)

12 to 15 curry leaves (kadi patta)

1/4 teaspoon asafoetida (hing)

18 to 20 cashews (kaju)

HOW TO MAKE RECIPE

Cooking the rice:

Rinse the rice and peanuts first. Add 2.5 cups water. Soak both rice and peanuts for 20 to 25 mins. Add salt.

Keep on the stove top and cook the rice.

If required, then you can add some more water while cooking the rice.

Bring to a boil and then lower the flame. Simmer till the rice grains are cooked well. The peanuts would also cook well. Cover and keep aside.

Preparing the lentils and veggies:

Soak 1 tbsp tightly packed tamarind in 1/2 or 2/3 cup warm water for 25 to 30 mins. Later squeeze and extract the tamarind pulp.

Add rinsed tuvar dal/pigeon pea lentils, turmeric powder and 2 to 2.5 cups water and pressure cook for 8 to 9 whistles or till the dal is cooked soft. Once the pressure settles down on its own, mash the dal and keep aside.

In another pan, take the chopped veggies and 1/4 tsp salt. Pour 2 cups water and stir. Cover and allow the veggies to cook till they are cooked and still retain their shape. Mixing:

Now in the cooker with the mashed dal, add the cooked rice and peanuts.

Then add the cooked vegetables along with its stock. Stir lightly.

Add 1 cup water. Add tamarind pulp. Mix everthing well taking care the rice grains do not break.

Now in another pan or bowl, take the 3 tbsp bisi bele bath masala and 1 cup water.

Stir very well. The masala tend to stick to the back of the spoon while stirring, so scrape it off and add to the mixture.

Now add this bisi bele bath + water mixture in the cooker. Add desiccated coconut. Add 1 tsp salt or as required. Stir

Keep the cooker without the lid on the stove top and simmer on a low flame for about 20 to 25 mins. Add more water if required. Keep on stirring often. The raw aroma of 1 tablespoon tightly packed seedless tamarind soaked in ½ the tamarind has to go away and all the flavors should be blended well. Cover and keep aside once done.

Tempering:

In an another pan or the tadka/tempering pan, heat ghee 3 tablespoon bisi bele bath masala dissolved in 1 cup water or oil first. Crackle the mustard seeds and then temper the curry leaves, marathi moggu, dry red chilies, cashews and asafoetida till the dry red chilies change color and the cashews turn a light golden. Don't burn the spices.

> Pour this tempering in the prepared bisi bele bath. Stir and cover the cooker with its lid for about 5 mins, so that the tempering flavors infuse in the bisi bele bath.

> Serve with potato or banana chips/wafers or fried papads. Top with some ghee if you prefer.
